

A Message from Pastor Kim



Lately we have had the blessed gift of having the Northern Lights be visible to many in our nighttime skies. This prompted me to think about whether or not this phenomenon was ever mentioned in our Scriptures or seen by those magi, aka astrological scholars, who were looking to the night skies often, to see what the heavens were doing or predicting. In my mind, when I have had the gift of seeing the Northern Lights, the way the light moves across the sky, sometimes in a stepping or chopping motion, looks like people walking upward. Other times, it looks like a sweeping path moving back and forth guiding our eyes and hearts to follow back and forth.

Here is the science behind how we get to see this beautiful show in our night skies: The northern lights are an interplay between the sun's energies, the earth's magnetic fields and atmosphere. The sun throws out charged particles that transports through space towards earth in a solar wind. Some of the particles draw down towards the earth's magnetosphere with a very high speed, 300-1000 km/second. The light phenomena appear when the particles collide with the atoms and molecules in our atmosphere. If the collision is powerful enough some of the particle's motive energy transforms into the light phenomena of northern lights.

Northern lights, or Aurora Borealis, is a phenomenon

"The Parables" † June 2023 † page 3 that can be seen dancing over the sky in the northern regions of the hemisphere. It flickers and plays over the clear sky in the nights. The northern lights are usually green but can also be red, violet, blue-white or slightly yellowish. The activity on the sun occurs with a cycle of about eleven years i.e. a peak every 11th year. In addition, there is a 27-day cycle, which also controls the auroral activity. We currently are in this 11th year, thus the reason we have seen them more frequently as of late.

As for the Scriptural or Spiritual documentation of the Aurora Borealis, I discovered quite the treasure trove. This sky phenomena has always existed in the mythology of the people since the beginning of time and in many cultures. Within the Bible, it is mentioned in the book of Ezekiel in the Old Testament. "I looked, and I saw a windstorm coming out of the north—an immense cloud with flashing lightning and surrounded by brilliant light." -Ezekiel 1:4 NIV

Within Scandinavian cultures, Like Norway or Finland, some spoke of the aurora appearing when whales were playing games. The Danes believed the lights were caused by swans competing to see who could fly further north. According to legend, some of the swans became trapped in the ice and, as they tried to escape, they flapped their wings creating flurries of light in the sky. Swedish fishermen looked forward to seeing the aurora, as they thought the lights were the reflections of giant schools of herring swimming nearby. For them, an aurora sighting brought good fortune and the promise of a hefty catch.

Estonians, for example, believed that the Northern Lights were wonderful sleighs taking guests to a spectacular wedding celebration in the heavens. AND similarly, in Greco-Roman mythology, Aurora is the personification of the dawn, and the sister of the sun and the moon. The ancient Greeks and Romans believed that every day Aurora raced across the sky in her chariot, alerting her brother and sister to the breaking of the new day. Watching the Northern Lights stretch across the sky, it's easy to imagine how this story took form.

Many of the stories surrounding the Northern Lights in North American communities arose from the belief that they were the souls of departed ancestors. It was even thought that the lights might be the spirits of the animals they hunted. Native American stories depict the Northern Lights as torches held by spirits who were tasked with leading the souls of the recently deceased over the abyss to the land of brightness and plenty, and believed strongly in

the *circle of life.* To communicate with people on Earth, they believed the Northern Lights made a whistling sound, which was to be answered by humans with whispers. Inuit tribes believed they could summon the Aurora to converse with their dead relatives. Cree Indians believed the lights were a way of communicating with their ancestors, and when dogs barked at the lights, it was because they recognized their lost companions.

In Canada and northern Michigan, Algonquin and Ojibwe tribes believed the creator of the Earth, Nanabozho, moved to the far north and lit a huge fire to let his people know that even though he was far away, he was still thinking of them. The aurora was a reflection of this fire. The Menominee Indians of Wisconsin believed what they saw were gentle giants fishing at night, and that the lights were created by their torches as they fished.

But the oldest images of the aurora borealis are a couple of cave paintings in Rouffinac, France. The paintings consist of lines and arcs drawn with the fingers of stone-age hunters who lived about 10,000 years ago. One can assume that the aurora had the same meaning for them as it had later on for the Sámi people, the Inuit's and the Indians all the way until the 1900s.

For many, the Northern Lights symbolize new beginnings. Seeing these colors in the sky could mean the beginning of a new chapter and the closing of an old one, with new ventures on the horizon. More broadly, the Northern Lights can also signify the unknown, and everything about the universe that is beyond human comprehension, much like we are told about our lives of faith in Christ.

We likely hold this beauty in ceaseless awe, as we try as we may to decipher how it comes and brings hope and magnetism to something beyond our understanding. It reminds us of how vast the universe is, and the beauty that it holds. Most especially, we are thankful for a beauty that comes even in the darkest of nights, from a creator that is so artistic and creative that even the skies of night are lit sometimes for our wonderment.

NEMN Synod Assembly Recap

Fellow Parishioners,

This past weekend we attended the Synod Assembly in Brainerd with Pastor Kim. Between the opening and closing services we experienced "Disciple Conversation: The Son Makes You Free to Welcome, Connect, Reform and Support," and the business side of the North East Minnesota Synod.

Speakers and group activities emphasized how through Jesus Christ we are to welcome, connect, reform and support all. Display tables around the hall provided information for those organizations ready and able to provide assistance as we welcome, connect, reform and support, i.e., CHUM, LSS, Camp Onomia, Camps Hiawatha and Vermilion, WELCA, etc.

We voted on nominated candidates for the various positions (all voted in), the 2024 budget (approved), resolution to support tiny house communities (approved), resolution to declare our synod a pollinator supporter (approved), resolution to continue our commitment to the Synod EcoFaith Network (approved), etc. Discussions ensued, questions were answered for most prior to voting. The recommended amendments to the Synod Constitution were sent back to the Synod Council for further review.

Chris and I enjoyed our time at the Synod Assembly. We enjoyed the process, all of the friendly people we met and were reacquainted with, and all we learned. We highly recommend everyone experience this at least once.

FRLC at Second Harvest




French River Readers

Post-Secondary Scholarship News

French River Lutheran Church offers a scholarship to graduating senior high students. For the graduating class of 2024, the scholarship amount is \$1,000 for French River Lutheran Church students who meet the criteria.

The scholarship program was started in 2010. Since that time \$35,500 has been available to our seniors. Criteria for the scholarship is available on the FRLC website and in the church office. Letters were recently mailed to those FRLC students in the Class of 2024 which included the criteria. If your student did not receive a letter or if you have any questions, please contact the church office.

A new scholarship was created in 2023 for FRLC members entering an accredited seminary to secure a theology degree. The scholarship will be a matching program for donations made by individual members of the congregation for a seminary student, up to the amount of \$2,000. The match does not include funds budgeted as part of the annual budget. The scholarship is paid to the student upon the successful completion of the school year. The student is eligible for up to four annual scholarships. The student must consult with the Scholarship Committee once committed to attend a seminary in order to discuss plans and receive approval. *"The Parables"* † June 2023 † page 6 Donations or memorials to the Post-Secondary Scholarship Fund are welcome at any time. These will help keep the fund growing so we can continue to support our FRLC students as they pursue further education.

This spring due to the bigger projects that the Property Committee members have on their plates, they are not planning a spring clean-up day. But!!!! There are still some small projects that a family or a couple of members might take on to assist. Below is a list that you might consider picking from:

- Fellowship hall: We will be needing some assistance with removing the old carpet in the Fellowship Hall when the new carpet tiles arrive.
- We will need assistance laying the new carpet tiles down and clean-up following the project. Dates yet to be determined. Contact Ken Peterson or the office if you might be able to help with this.
- Move the brown metal chair. gardens and rack to the boy scout bldg.
- Parking lot curbs and sidewalks sweep up or blow excess sand from winter deicing.
- Clean up the Rain Garden near Ryan Rd and Parsonage and/or cleanup the Rain garden between the Parsonage and Church.
- Wash interior windows.
- Deep clean the **nursery** includes wiping off furniture and toys (remove any broken toys), straightening books dusting vacuuming corners.
- Moving woodchips by Boy Scout bldg. to the area used by the Outdoor School to fill holes and protect tree roots. Requires a wheelbarrow and fork or shovel and rake. This is a great project for younger members.
- Swing set and Play area equipment- Tighten any bolts, do repairs of swings or other parts. Check walls of ball court, tighten any bolts where needed, bumper for top. Note any missing items or replacement parts needed and give the list to the office (Property Committee).

French River Lutheran Church Lessons This Month

June 4 – First Sunday after Pentecost

<u>Genesis 1:1--2:4a;</u> <u>Psalm 8;</u> <u>2 Corinthians 13:11-13;</u> Matthew 28:16-20.

Though the word *trinity* is not found in the scriptures, today's second reading includes the apostolic greeting that begins the liturgy: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. In the gospel Jesus sends his disciples forth to baptize in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. More than a doctrine, the Trinity expresses the heart of our faith: we have experienced the God of creation made known in Jesus Christ and with us always through the Holy Spirit. We celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity in word and sacrament, as we profess the creed, and as we are sent into the world to bear witness to our faith.

June 11 – Second Sunday after Pentecost

Hosea 5:15--6:6; Psalm 50:7-15; Romans 4:13-25; Matthew 9:9-13, 18-26

Though Jesus was a devout Jew who practiced his faith, he was criticized for eating with tax collectors and sinners—the religiously nonobservant. Jesus criticizes the self-righteous and reminds us that mercy is to be at the heart of our religious practices. God continues to be made known in those on the margins of society, like Matthew the tax collector and the hemorrhaging woman. As we gather each Lord's day we receive the healing that makes us well and sends us forth to be signs of God's mercy for the world.

June 18 – Third Sunday after Pentecost

<u>Exodus 19:2-8a;</u> <u>Psalm 100;</u> <u>Romans 5:1-8;</u> <u>Matthew 9:35—10:8 [9-23]</u>.

Moses tells the Israelites that they are called to be a priestly kingdom and a holy people. Jesus sends out the disciples as laborers into the harvest. In baptism we too are anointed for ministry, sharing God's compassion with our needy world. From the Lord's table we go forth to proclaim the good news, to heal the sick, and to share our bread with the hungry.

June 25 – Fourth Sunday after Pentecost

<u>Jeremiah 20:7-13; Psalm 69:7-10 [11-15] 16-18;</u> <u>Romans 6:1b-11; Matthew 10:24-39</u>.

God does not promise that the path of the disciple will be easy. Jeremiah feels the pain of rejection from those who do not want to hear what he has to say. Jesus declares that his words may bring stark division. Even so, we need not be afraid for God accounts for each hair on our heads. Though we may experience rejection, frustration, division, and death, God's grace and love make us a new creation each *"The Parables"* † June 2023 † page 10 day. Marked with the cross and filled with holy food, we are sent from worship to witness to Christ in the world.


