A Message from Pastor Kim



"Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, he departed and went out to a desolate place and there he prayed." (<u>Mark 1:35</u>)

We are coming to the end of the summer, the season in which many take time to travel, to visit friends or relatives, or go on an adventure to new places and spaces. Many of you know that our family was given a vacation to Iceland, with my Husband's family, to celebrate my Mother and Father-in-law's 50th Wedding Anniversary. A gift of expense but also love for the creation that God has given us to be aweinspired by and to respect and preserve. It was time together, as a family, both immediate and extended, that we often do not get to experience enough due to our busy schedules. As it is with all family dynamics, there were many highs and only a few lows with being together in a big group— a variety of views and ideas all trying to work together. Rest and connection, laughter and crying.

Our experience in Iceland was amazing. The land of fire and ice was something almost surreal. Landscapes of mountains or lands that looked like baked cakes with a crackled top of moss and lava *"The Parables"* † September 2023 † page 3 rock. Dormant volcanoes popping up alongside glaciers. Basalt rock formations that look carved by the hand of God. Geothermal pools that provide warmth, or rest for aching muscles or spirit. Many beaches along its northern seas are of varying colors; black, rust red, and some "blonde" colored sands of the coastlines that have been worked down by the waves. AND waterfalls, sometimes one every few miles, a remembrance of streams of mercy, renewal, and washing of selves. Waterfalls where an unclose view gives forth a splash or spray or downpour of a remembrance of baptism in the moment of visiting and not always by choice due to the winds of force from the falling waters.

<u>Dr. McKay Caston</u> originally posted in the blog -the Mustard Seed, stated that vacations are good for our spiritual selves and especially for our leaders in the faith who carry not only their burdens and joys but also those of their flock and people. "In order to work hard, we must learn to rest well."

Europeans call their vacations, "holiday." Holiday is a compressed version of "holy day." Historically, the church has set aside "holy days" as times to stop and reflect, not upon our work but upon God's work for us. A *holy* day is intended to be a *rest* day. It is special. Sacred in the sense that it becomes an intrusion of the eternal heaven into our time and space lives.

The concept of holiday gets to the heart of what a pastoral vacation can and maybe should be. This draws near to the principle of Sabbath, which is a pattern of work and rest that God established at creation and with the ceremonial Sabbath observance of the Israelites as they crossed from Egypt into the land of promise. The land where they would finally be at rest from their laborious journey through the wilderness. The principle is that, *in order to work hard, we must learn to rest well.* In this light, we can see that vacation is an integral part of or subheading under the umbrella of pastoral vocation. We see Jesus practice this labor, rest, renewal cycle with his disciples.

In our Gospels, we read about Jesus calling his disciples and traveling from town to town. Then he sends them out, two by two, to do front line missionary work 'Come with me by yourselves to a

quiet place and rest for a while.' —Jesus said to his disciples. We should note that the word "rest" is an imperative verb in the original Greek text (*anapausasthe*). Jesus is not <u>recommending</u> rest. He is <u>commanding</u> it.

Jesus recognizes the need for his disciples to experience a season of life away from the stress of ordinary life. For them, this required solitude. They had been engaging people, extending a tremendous amount of emotional and mental energy. Now they needed solitude to recover. Some alone time in places where they can feel renewal.

While the six-day/one day cycle is designed for the wear and tear of normal life, Jesus shows us that there are seasons in life and ministry that require a more extended period devoted to recovery. The purpose of this season of rest is not just to "take a break" or because we are lazy and don't like hard work. In fact, seasons of deep rest and effective recovery are designed so that we can work hard. It is purposeful recovery of body, soul, mind, and emotion.

Martin Luther, who very well may have suffered from clinical depression, (along with a host of other wellknown pastors/scholars), believed that the pen was the heaviest of all work implements. He knew that brainpower not only depleted the mind but the body. He knew what we all know, which is that the exertion of mental energy is analogous to physical labor. You know a vacation has fulfilled its purpose when you can't wait to get back to work. This Iceland trip felt like that was for me when I committed to letting go for a bit. Towards the end, I thought about how I

could share with you all, the joys and awe that this place gave us, the rest and recharge we experienced. *(But then the dreaded Covid decided to join us at the last moment to be a little bit of a temporary detour.)*

Since I love my job, it can be easy to slip into working "on" ministry, even when I'm not "in" it. Not only do *I* need time for renewal, but the church also needs me to take time for renewal. We should be reminded that we grow better in our *"The Parables" †* **September 2023** *†* **page 4** connection and spiritual faith when we have a little time apart.

Jesus modeled mental rest. He was unafraid to pull away and leave the crowds, even when they desperately wanted Him. He would get into a boat with the disciples and go to the other side, away from the multitudes. It was often in the midst of chaos, when people were clamoring for Him.

But Jesus was clear on what God was calling Him to do, so other people's pressing needs and their desire for His presence didn't drive His activity. Honestly, even as a pastor, I constantly struggle with this type of rest. The urgency often drives my activity and demands determine what I do. Because in my mind, if I don't do it, it won't get done. It's all up to me. But in actuality, nothing is ultimately up to me. It's all up to God. And God doesn't need my/our exhausted, frenzied help to accomplish God's purposes. God is inviting us to slow our pace, savor God's gifts and enjoy the present moment without worrying about what's not done. And as I do that, I make space for the things that are energized and creative. I see the value of an unhurried heart and body. And how that impacts all aspects of my life.

God is calling all of us to fully rest in Him. To enjoy spiritual, physical and mental rest. When we do, we will recover and refresh our lives . And then we will learn the unforced rhythms of grace. Rest, renew, and restart in Jesus today. Thank you for allowing me time to rest and renew in my faith, to be a better leader for you all.



start season two and meet Monday evenings at 6:00 PM in the Fireside Room; we'll start up again September 18th.



To schedule your photography appointment online, simply scan the QR code below. Or go to <u>www.ucdir.com</u> & click the "Photography Appointment Scheduling Login" button. Enter <u>mn375</u> in the "Church Code" field and enter <u>photos</u> in the "Church Password" field.

Note: The Church Code & Password are case sensitive. Follow the prompts to schedule your family's appointment time. If you have 5 or more in your family, please use 2 time slots. The online scheduling option may not be available Saturday or Sunday because we will be doing paper sign-ups at church on selected weekends.

Appointments fill up quickly, so schedule as soon as possible to secure your preferred date and time.

- 3. St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church at 2316 E 4th St, Superior WI is doing photos November 14-18, you can call the customer service department at 419-522-5011 to schedule a time at St. Michael's or online using the instructions below. Use Church Code **wi286**, password: **photos** for online registration.
- 4. Last option is to call the company Customer Service Department at 419-522-5011 and have them look other at other places outside of Duluth where you might be and see if there is a church near where you might be to have your photos taken.
 - a. There is a church in Minneapolis doing photos September 5-9
 - b. There are some other churches in Minneapolis doing photos in October but call Customer Service.

Online Registration for photos at other churches:

- A. You can register online once those online registrations have been opened (generally about 2 months prior to the photo sessions.)
- B. Use the appropriate church code for the site; password is **photos** for all sites.
- C. On the online registration form, we need to add in parentheses "(walk-in mn375)" either before or after your FIRST NAME and before or after our LAST NAME in the online form (two separate boxes on the form).

When we get our pictures taken, we need to inform the photographer that we are "walk-ins to mn375" so that the photographer sends it to our church.

From "Harvest Highlights," a publication from Second Harvest Northern Lakes Food Bank:

What's a Food Bank Anyway?

We're often confused with a food shelf, but did you know we're the only "food bank" supporting agency and community partners (food shelves, on-site meal programs and tribal organizations) throughout NE Minnesota and NW Wisconsin?

Our role in hunger-relief is to supply regional partners with donated and purchased food allowing them to feed families, children and seniors in your local community. Much of the food we rescue is donated by our nation's food industry (manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers, and growers) who have surplus to share. Without us, it's estimated that as much as 40% of the food produced in the U.S. would enter our nation's waste stream.

If you'd like to learn more about our unique organization and impact throughout the Northland, you can join us for our upcoming "Behind the Scenes" Tours on Thursday, September 14 at 12 p.m. or Thursday, December 14 at 5:30 p.m. at our Duluth facility. "I loved it," shares volunteer Cindy who attended our tour. "It was fascinating to see where all the food comes from and where it goes. And that you save food from local restaurants."



Lessons This Month

September 3 – Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost

Jeremiah 15:15-21; Psalm 26:1-8; Romans 12:9-21; Matthew 16:21-28.

The prophet Jeremiah speaks of the incurable wound of his suffering yet finds in God's words the delight of his heart. When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering, Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world.

September 10 – Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost

<u>Ezekiel 33:7-11; Psalm 119:33-40; Romans 13:8-14;</u> <u>Matthew 18:15-20</u>.

Conflict is a part of relationships and life in community. Jesus' words in today's gospel are often used in situations having to do with church discipline. The prophet Ezekiel tells of warning the wicked to turn from their ways, and Paul reminds us that love is the fulfilling of the law. We gather in the name of Christ, assured that he is present among us with gifts of peace and reconciliation.

September 17 – Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost

<u>Genesis 50:15-21;</u> <u>Psalm 103:[1-7] 8-13;</u> <u>Romans 14:1-12;</u> <u>Matthew 18:21-35</u>.

In today's second reading Paul questions why we judge one another, since we all stand before the judgment of God. Yet we do sin against one another, and Jesus' challenge that we forgive seventy-seven times reveals God's boundless mercy. When we hear the words of forgiveness in worship and sign ourselves with the cross, we are renewed in baptism to be signs of reconciliation in the world.

September 24 – Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost

<u>Jonah 3:10--4:11; Psalm 145:1-8;</u> Philippians 1:21-30; Matthew 20:1-16.

Matthew narrates one of Jesus' controversial parables in which Jesus says that the reign of God is like that of a landowner who pays his workers the same wage no matter what time of day they began to work. When God changes God's mind about punishing Nineveh for their evil ways, Jonah is angry. Yet God is gracious and merciful, abounding in steadfast love. In baptism we receive the grace of God that is freely given to all. As Martin Luther wrote, in the presence of God's mercy we are all beggars.
